Over the subject period (fall, 2022 – spring, 2023), the Sociology & Social Work Department offered a variety of courses, including:

The <u>average completion rate</u> for Sociology courses was 84.7% and for Social Science courses the average completion rate was 77.1%. These completion rates are significantly higher than the College's Completion Set Standard of 74.1%. Combined, courses included in the Sociology and Social Work Department/program had an average completion rate of 80.9%, which is significantly higher than the College's Completion Set Standard.

The <u>average success rate</u> for Sociology courses was 65.0%, and for Social Science courses the average success rate was 60.9%. This places sociology courses above the College's Success Set Standard of 62.0%. Combined, courses included in the Sociology and Social Work Department/program have an average success rate of 63%, which is higher than the College's Success Set Standard.

Examining the disaggregated course data, five courses had average success rates below the College's Success Set Standard of 62.0%:

- SOSC 120 F Introduction to Probability and Statistics (61.3%)
- SOSC 125 Introduction to Research Methods (35.7%)
- SOC 230 F Sociology of Gender (61.3%)
- SOC 280 F Drugs and Society (54.7%)
- SOC 290 F Sociology of Race and Ethnicity (56.2%)

Further examination of disaggregated course data reveals two courses with average completion rates below the College's Completion Set Standard of 74.1%:

- SOSC 125 F Introduction to Research Methods (64.3%)
- SOC 280 F Drugs and Society (71.7%)

Overall, course completion rates in the Sociology and Social Work Department/program are good, with an average completion rate of 80.9%, which is significantly higher than the College's Completion Standard of 74.1%, but lower than the College's Completion Aspirational Goal of 86.7%.

Overall, course success rates in the Sociology and Social Work Department reveal an average success rate of 63%, which is slightly higher than the College's Success Set Standard of 62%; however, it is significantly lower than the College's Success Aspirational Goal of 78.3%.

While the Sociology and Social Work Department/program meets the College Standards for Completion and Success, we recognize there is work to be done to improve, particularly relative to success rates. The disaggregated course completion and success rates are generally favorable, but also reflect some low percentages which reveal areas for improvement. For example, while overall the "Ethnicity" category shows 91.76% "meets expectations," there is still room for improvement in a few categories, including the Filipino demographic.

2. Does the SLO data show significant achievement gaps among demographic groups in your program? If so, where are the gaps and what steps can your program take to shrink them? If not, to what do you attribute your success in minimizing the achievement gap?

The demographic data for the Sociology and Social Work Department/program compared to the College overall compares favorably, as indicated below:

- African American 81.97% met expectations (College overall = 69.33%)
- American Indian/Alaskan Native 100% met expectations (College overall = 80.72%)
- Asian 94.12% met expectations (College overall = 91.03%)
- Filipino 83.61% met expectations (College overall = 89.45%)
- *Hispanic 93.15% met expectations (College overall = 84.44%)*
- Pacific Islander 100% met expectations (College overall = 73.53%)
- White Non-Hispanic 91.76% met expectations (College overall = 88.78%)

In summary, the demographic data show that African American, American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian, Hispanic, Pacific Islander and White Non-Hispanic groups met or exceeded expectations compared to the College rates overall for these groups. Only the Filipino category outcomes were lower for the Sociology and Social Work Department/program than for the College overall: 83.61% for the Department, compared to 89.45% for the College overall.

The percentages for the Sociology and Social Work Department ranged from a low of 81.97% for African Americans to a high of 100% for American Indian/Alaska Natives and Pacific Islanders. While the results are generally positive, we recognize the advisability of department self-analysis and self-critique to improve outcomes for all students. Our department faculty will continue to recommend essential Fullerton College student support services such as the Writing Center, Tutoring Center, and the excellent research librarians available to our students to improve outcomes for all demographic groups in the Sociology and Social Work program, including the Filipino demographic category.
